CONSERVATION

Situated in the heart of **Cairngorms National Park**, the largest National Park in the United Kingdom, among the region's soaring mountains, deep river-cut valleys and swathes of dense pine forests, the very essence of the Fife Arms is inspired by this extraordinary landscape and surrounding nature.

With such natural beauty comes great responsibility and we are committed to supporting the region's delicate ecological balance through our programme. The hotel actively supports many local environmental protection projects, including an initiative aimed at safeguarding the River Dee's freshwater pearl mussels which, at one point, were hunted to near extinction. In fact, the cast bronze mussel shell fobs - on all the Fife Arms' room keys - references this much-loved endangered species.

On a broader scale, Ben Carter, the Director of Sustainable Growth at Artfarm (our parent company) works closely with local estates, landowners and environmental agencies across the region to ensure that our working practices and educational programmes do everything they can to champion the importance of environmental stewardship to our staff and guests.

Our enthusiasm for the local environment is undoubtedly fuelled by the passion of the Deeside residents who embrace the mantra 'by leaves we live', first said by the pioneering environmentalist, sociologist and town planner Patrick Geddes, who was born in the nearby village of Ballater in 1854, and whose ideas continue to resonate today.

If you are interested in learning more about our conservation programme and how this delicate landscape is managed, our Ghillie team can organise guided walks with our respected researchers. For those that wish to go into more detail, we can arrange private tailored briefings with our conservation experts.

ARCHITECTURAL GEMS

From the Victorian grandeur of the Fife Arms to ancient castles and contemporary cabins, Braemar and the surrounding area are home to a charming collection of architectural styles. So lace up your walking boots and join one of our knowledgeable local experts on a guided architectural walk around the village and the wider area.





Scottish Castle Country Tour

Known as 'Scottish Castle Country' there are over 300 magnificent castles within Aberdeenshire alone, with many of these gems accessible on a full-day excursion from the Fife Arms.

Contemporary Architecture Tour

Pair your architecture tour with a fine whisky tipple and make your way to the new state-of- the-art visitor centre at Macallan Distillery. Cut into the hills of Speyside the new distillery, with its rippling wildflower swathed roof, is the work of international firm,

Rogers Stirk Harbour + Partners and sits on the Easter Elchies estate, which has been home to the single malt whisky since 1824.

V&A Dundee

Embrace all things design and spend the day at **V&A Dundee**. A 2-hour drive on the stunning east coast of the country, along the banks of the River Tay, the striking building was designed by Japanese architect Kengo Kuma and takes its cues from the dramatic rocky cliffs that line Scotland's coast.

Home to one quarter of Scotland's native forests, five of the country's six highest peaks and many rare and endangered species of wildlife, the magnificent Cairngorms National Park is often described as nature's playground thanks to its outdoor pursuits from its incredible walking and cycling routes to water sport and snow sport activities, 12 golf courses and even the first permanent bridge-based bungee jump in the UK.

GOLF

Lying in a natural amphitheatre created by the imposing Grampian Mountains and part of the magnificent Cairngorms National Park, Braemar is the home of Scotland's highest and wildest golf course, where play is watched by endangered ospreys, watchful stags and rare red squirrels.

A great 18-hole course, it is suitable for all levels of experience, but for beginners who want to try their hand at this ancient sport, personal instructors are available too.

A round at Braemar golf course costs £35 per guest. To book a round of golf or a lesson, please contact our Ghillie team. If you are looking to experience other local golf courses, Royal Deeside is home to many wild courses and golf clubs including the Aboyne, Banchory and Ballater golf clubs. BRAEMAR TENNIS CLUB

Braemar tennis club, supported by The Fife Arms, is a great way to start playing tennis and develop new skills during your stay with us.

The newly opened Tennis courts sit next door to Braemar Golf Club in the picturesque amphitheatre. A court is available to guests at all times, and this can be booked via our Ghillie team.


LOCAL HEROES

From bakeries to restaurants, there is so much to experience, so here are a few of our favourites, found in the neighbouring villages of Braemar:

The Highlanders Bakehouse is a wee bakery in the nearby village of Crathie and is a must-visit to try Aberdeenshire's famous buttery. Also known as a rowie, this wonderfully buttery, flaky bread roll-similar to a croissant - is best served toasted with a good lashing of butter, jam and a strong cup of tea.

In the picturesque Highland village of Ballater, Rothesay Rooms pays tribute to the best of Scottish flavours, with light, modern dishes using only fresh, seasonal and local produce. The menu changes with the seasons but expect perfectly executed plates like the seared scallop and pressed oxtail, served with celeriac, burnt leek and topped with truffle.

Finally, on the banks of the River Dee, a little over an hour's drive from Braemar, Maryculter House is home to Poachers Brasserie, a casual all-day dining spot that serves classic favourites from juicy beef burgers to baked rice pudding.





Fishing

Try your hand at salmon or trout fishing in the Dee, Don or Tay rivers with local experts to advise and instruct.

WEATHER

Aberdeenshire has been described as a place of big skies and wide horizons, loved for its fresh clear air and the quality of its light. Summer nights are lengthy and light with only a few hours of true darkness. In contrast, winter nights are long and star filled, occasionally lit by the spectacular Northern Lights (Aurora Borealis).

Braemar has twice entered the UK weather records with the lowest ever UK temperature of -27.2° C (-17.0° F), on 11 February 1895 and 10 January 1982.

It has also entered the record books on 1 October 2015 as being both the hottest and the coldest place in the UK – all in the same day! The mercury soared to 23.3°C (73.9°F) during the day but dipped dramatically to -1.3°C (29.6°F) in the early hours of the morning.

It's fair to say that you just never know what the Scottish weather is going to throw at you. And it's also no surprise to learn that Prince Albert donated a weather station to the village of Braemar, which is still in situ today.

A popular seasonal pastime is to check out the live weather conditions on the Glenshee snow gates webcam. Essential viewing in the winter months.

DOGS

Following faithfully on the heels of both HM Queen Victoria and our reigning Monarch HM Queen Elizabeth II, we love dogs. We have artworks immortalising them and a hotel bedroom dedicated to one, so it goes without saying you are welcome to bring your four-legged friends to stay with us at the Fife Arms.

We have a range of dog-friendly rooms and a supply of comfy dog beds, feeding bowls, blankets or anything else your dog may need to make themselves at home. Should the Highland weather prove too chilly for your pet, our Fife Arms Shop stocks a range of dog coats, while a visit to the Ghillie's desk may well become a highlight for your dog, not least for the stash of delicious treats they keep at hand.

The only restrictions we have are that dogs are not permitted in the Drawing Room, Clunie Dining Room or Spa but are welcome in all other public areas, including the Flying Stag bar where food is served all day.

FILM, LITERATURE AND MUSIC

Film

From the whimsical romanticism of Vincente Minnelli's 'Brigadoon' to Danny Boyle's darkly comic 'Trainspotting', Scotland, in all its forms, has inspired filmmakers of the world.

The extraordinary Aberdeenshire landscape has featured in major studio productions including Christopher Nolan's 'The Dark Knight Rises', Disney/ Pixar's 'Brave', and Zeffirelli's 'Hamlet', as well as low-budget sci-fi classics like 'The Planet' and 'Outpost 11'.

Our area too, has inspired one of the most iconic visual motifs of the Disney film empire; within an hour of the Fife Arms, you'll find the pink, turreted splendour of **Craigievar Castle** - a fabulous example of Scots Baronial architecture - which is believed to have been the inspiration for Walt Disney's Cinderella Castle.



Literature

Stories loom large in Scottish culture and Braemar and the Cairngorms have their own rich heritage as an inspiration for writers. From Robert Louis Stevenson's penning of 'Treasure Island' whilst holidaying in Braemar to the Victorian period's most notorious poet Lord Byron, and his intoxication of the Cairngorm landscape, our location has inspired much literary greatness.

Away, ye gay landscapes, ye gardens of roses,
In you let the minions of luxury rove,
Restore me the rocks where the snow-flake reposes,
Though still they are sacred to freedom and love.
Yet Caledonia, beloved are thy mountains,
Round their white summits though elements war,
Though cataracts foam 'stead of smooth-flowing fountains,
I sigh for the valley of dark Lochnagar.

If you are to read one book before coming to visit us at the Fife Arms, we highly recommend 'The Living Mountain', by Scottish author Nan Shepherd. Completed in 1944, 'The Living Mountain' has come to redefine the experience of hillwalking and mountaineering from being 'on' the mountain to being 'in' the mountain. Her lyrical descriptions of her homeland have become the source of pride and inspiration to many beyond the mountain sport community and Shepherd's national importance is recognised by her image being carried on the country's five pound note.

For the poetic of heart, we urge you to dive into the pages of Scotland's national bard, Robert Burns or seek out the hidden gems of Marion Angus, a turn-of-the-century poet who often wrote in her native Scots's dialect. Through these poets' words, you will see the land of Scotland but also the character of its people.

Music

Scotland is internationally known for its traditional music, which is instantly recognisable from its beat to its fiddles and bagpipes. This proud tradition has been re-embraced by a raft of new Scottish singer-songwriters who have returned to and re-imagined the music of their native land and seas, such as Lau, Jenny Sturgeon, Karine Polwart and Julie Fowlis.

But Scottish music isn't all about the past. It is also home to a thriving indie, pop and dance music scene – and a few major mainstream acts out there like Lewis Capaldi, Calvin Harris and Biffy Clyro.

When with us in Braemar you will have a chance to hear many of the different sounds of Scotland with regular weekly folk nights in our Flying Stag bar; intimate indie and contemporary folk gigs hosted by - and in - the Braemar Gallery and a varied programme of folk, classical and choral music in St Margaret's Art Centre in the heart of the village.

A regular performer within our Flying Stag Bar is the internationally respected local fiddle player, Paul Anderson. Paul is a highly skilled musician and holds a wealth of knowledge about Scotland's traditional music history and culture. He hosts regular musical session on his social media pages and has even composed a tune for the Fife Arms.
