The Braemar Literary Festival aims to explore the creative use of words and text in their broadest sense; celebrating the works of best selling authors alongside visual artists, spoken word performers, scriptwriters, critics and publishers alike, reflecting the many ways in which the 'literary' creatively enhances our lives.







THE QUEEN'S READING ROOM

The Queen's Reading Room is a charity and literary hub on a mission to help readers and non-readers alike find and connect with books they will love. Through exclusive author interviews and behind-the- scenes content, a chart-topping podcast and its' annual literary festival, The Queen's Reading Room seeks to advance education by providing opportunities for the appreciation of literature among adults and children, introducing and celebrating books from around the world and the extraordinary people who create them. Its purpose is to help more people find and connect with books – chosen for their educative, literary or historic merit - which enrich their lives and turn them into lifelong readers.

The charity is also committed to better understanding the benefits of reading and recently published its first neuroscientific study into the link between reading fiction and wellness, which proved that just 5 minutes of reading can reduce stress levels by almost 20%, improve concentration and focus by as much as 11%, and enable readers to feel better connected to each other.

The former Duchess of Cornwall launched 'The Reading Room' on Instagram in January 2021 with Charlie Mackesy and his wonderfully illustrated 'The Boy, The Mole, The Fox and The Horse'. Since then, there have been fourteen complete seasons with four widely different but equally compelling books featuring in each. The project was relaunched as the charity 'The Queen's Reading Room' in February 2023 by Her Majesty The Queen.

SIMON ARMITAGE

Simon Armitage is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Queen's Gold Medal for Poetry and an Ivor Novello. He has published over a dozen poetry collections including his latest Blossomise, an instant Sunday Times bestseller. Armitage also writes, records and performs with the band LYR. Never Good with Horses features his song lyrics for the first time. He is also the author of three non-fiction bestsellers: All Points North, Walking Home and Walking Away. A regular broadcaster, Armitage presents the popular BBC Radio 4 series The Poet Laureate has Gone to his Shed. He is Professor of Poetry at the University of Leeds and was elected Oxford Professor of Poetry (2015-2019). Armitage received a CBE in 2010 and was appointed Poet Laureate in 2019.

NICK BARLEY

Nick Barley is Director of the National Poetry Centre, the new Leeds-based organisation which will be the UK headquarters for poetry and the spoken word. He is also a Professor in Practice at Durham University. Nick was previously Director of the Edinburgh International Book Festival and a trustee of the Booker Prize Foundation.









JINNY BLOM

Jinny Blom is a leading garden designer and landscape architect who, since establishing her London-based landscape design practice in 2000, has created hundreds of much-lauded gardens all over the world. She has designed four award-winning gardens for the RHS Chelsea Flower Show, including her 'Healing Garden' developed in collaboration with King Charles III, has been a columnist for The Times and in 2002 won BBC Radio Broadcaster of the Year for her Radio 4 Woman's Hour features. Jinny has been nominated Woman of the Year an unprecedented three times for her services to society including her role as Artist in Residence at Chelsea & Westminster Hospital.

TOM PARKER BOWLES

A British food writer and critic, Tom Parker Bowles won the Guild of Food Writers 2010 award for his writings on British food. He is well known for his appearances as a judge and critic in numerous television food series including MasterChef and for his reviews of restaurant meals around the UK and overseas for GQ, Esquire and The Mail on Sunday. Tom is also a successful author of 8 books.

FIONA BRADLEY

Fiona Bradley has been Director of Fruitmarket in Edinburgh since 2003, running it as an organisation that centres artists and empowers audiences. She has made exhibitions with artists including Karla Black, Lee Lozano, Tacita Dean, Eva Hesse and Martin Creed. In 2015, she worked with Phyllida Barlow on a major exhibition, set, and commissioned Frances Morris to write the accompanying book, that has now been extended as the definitive publication on the work of Phyllida Barlow.



Jessie Burton is the multi-million bestselling author of The Miniaturist, The Muse, The Confession and The House of Fortune – all instant Sunday Times bestsellers. The Miniaturist and The Muse were Sunday Times no.1 bestsellers in hardback and paperback, and New York Times bestsellers. Jessie's books for children include Medusa, which was shortlisted for the Carnegie medal for writing. Her novels have been published in 40 languages.

His latest book, The Armour of Light, is set in his fictional town of Kingsbridge, and completes an eight-volume cycle of books which together chronicle the last 1,000 years of Western civilization.



FIONA KENNEDY

Fiona Kennedy is a singer, songwriter, and stage producer. In her varied career, she has sung for Her late Majesty The Queen, the G8 Summit launch, and for NATO ambassadors, presented BBC's Record Breakers, hosted Tartan TV for American channel PBS, and presented with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra. She has also performed at Celtic Connections and Transatlantic Sessions on BBC 2, toured with Runrig and acted in the West End. She is Patron of several international and local charities.

Fiona was awarded an OBE in 2014 for her services to music and charitable work.





SALLY MAGNUSSON

Sally Magnusson has forged a highly distinguished career as a broadcast journalist, television presenter and as a writer. Her written works include the Sunday Times bestseller Where Memories Go (2014), and her debut novel, The Sealwoman's Gift (2018), about the experience of a 17th century Icelandic woman abducted into slavery. Sally's fourth novel, set in Orkney and based on Norse mythology, is due out in 2025.



FRANCES MORRIS

Frances Morris, Director Tate Modern from 2016-2024, is curator of 'Phyllida Barlow. unscripted', a major retrospective of the late artist's work currently on show at Hauser & Wirth, Somerset and author of the forthcoming monograph on the artist. Frances has made many exhibitions and publications, including acclaimed retrospectives of Louise Bourgeois, Yayoi Kusama, and Agnes Martin, as well as Hilma Af Klint & Piet Mondrian: Forms of Life.

KATE MOSSE

Kate Mosse is the author of nine novels & short story collections, including the No 1 bestselling The Joubert Family Chronicles - The Burning Chambers and The City of Tears. A champion of women's creativity, Kate is the Founder Director of the Women's Prize for Fiction - the largest annual celebration of women's writing in the world - and sits on the Executive Committee of Women of the World. She is the Founder of the global campaign - #WomaninHistory - launched in January 2021 to honour, celebrate women's achievements throughout history. She was awarded an OBE in 2013 for services to literature and was named Woman of the Year for her service to the arts in the Everywoman Awards and is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts.

ANGELA PALMER

Angela Palmer is a Scottish sculptor with work in the permanent collections of international museums including the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum, Washington; the Science Museum, London; the National Galleries of Scotland, Edinburgh; and the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford. Mapping is at the core of her work, which investigate deep time and geology and invariably involve the collaboration of multi-disciplinary scientists worldwide.







VICKI PERRIN

CEO of The Queen's Reading Room, Vicki is a content producer, festival programmer and all-round bookworm. With a background in literary festivals, TV and Radio, including directing the BBC's 500 Words competition, Vicki is passionate about making great stories accessible to everyone.
